One particular visit that has stuck with Mrs Nicholson was when an elderly man who was unable to speak clearly started talking to her dog without problem as there was no pressure involved in the exchange.

Fellow <u>Animal Companions</u> WA volunteer Beth Croxon started taking her dog Buster to Bethesda Hospital in November and Mrs Nicholson says she is more than happy to hand over the leash to her.
